## Indigenous Field Trips at Nowashe Village

### *Half-Day Field Trip Experience*

Groups may select **three learning stations** from the topics below to create a customized **3-hour immersive field trip experience** tailored to grade level, curriculum goals, and student interests. Our Indigenous field trips take place at our **award-winning living museum Nowashe Village**.

#### *Choose your learning Stations:*

1. **Stone Tool Evolution:** Travel through the Paleo, Archaic, and Woodland periods while examining how Indigenous innovations evolved over time. Engage in hands-on tool exploration through using both authentic and replicated artifacts.



## Colonial Field Trips in Historic East Windsor Hills

### *Half-Day Field Trip Experience*

Groups may select **three learning stations** from the topics below to create a customized **3-hour immersive field trip experience** tailored to grade level, curriculum goals, and student interests. Programs combine artifact exploration, historic spaces, and interactive activities designed to bring history to life.

#### *Choose your learning Stations:*

1. **Ship Building and Commerce:** Explore how the Connecticut River shaped trade, transportation, and the shipping industry in New England. Look at artifacts and try hands-on activities both inside and outside at the historic 1786 Bissell House at Ferry Farms.

2. **Day in the Life:** Experience everyday village life during the Woodland Period through hands-on exploration of wigwams, tools, agriculture, food preparation, and domestic life.
  3. **Land Management:** Take a walk around Nowashe! Explore the native plants, animals, and ecosystems of Indigenous communities while learning about environmental stewardship and traditional food preparation, preservation, and cultivation.
  4. **Hunting and the Atlatl:** Experience one of humanity's earliest hunting technologies through hands-on spear throwing and interactive games inspired by Indigenous traditions of hunting. Atlatl throwing best suited for participants 8 years and older.
  5. **Native Games:** Learn like a kid again and explore how Indigenous people used games to teach lessons and skills. Learn the history and invention of Native games while playing games of chance, skill, and sport.
  6. **Archeology Lab:** Come find out how historians gather knowledge. Analyze authentic artifacts and discover how archaeologists uncover stories of the past through material evidence. Archeology Lab best suited for participants 12 years and older. [Click Here to Book!](#)
2. **Daily Colonial Life:** Explore how life was for colonists of all ages! Learn about farming practices, carding wool, colonial chores, and the daily routine while taking a full walking tour of historic 1786 Bissell House.
  3. **Local Economy, Trades, and Crafts:** Explore traditional craftsmanship, general stores, and local economy while learning how commerce and community shaped everyday colonial life at the historic 1786 East Windsor Hills Post Office.
  4. **One-Room Schoolhouse Experience (c. 1860):** Step into a historic schoolhouse and experience a typical 19th-century school day while exploring penmanship, discipline, games, chores, and childhood in early America.
  5. **Ink and Illumination:** Step into the daily life of colonial children through two essential early American skills: writing with quill and ink and hand-dipping candles. Participants explore communication, historic documents, and household labor while practicing cursive with goose quills before creating their own hand-dipped candle to take home.
  6. **Colonial Research Workshop:** Join us at one of our various historic sites to complete a full historical research workshop. This workshop includes conducting colonial research, archeology, primary sources, and colonial artifacts. Workshops are best suited for participants 12 years and older. [Click Here to Book!](#)

## Indigenous in School Field Trips

---

### **Package One: Discovering Indigenous Lifeways** *(Best suited for elementary audiences)*

This engaging 3 station introductory experience encourages curiosity, creativity, and hands-on exploration through three interactive learning stations:

1. **Stone Tool Evolution** — Explore authentic and replicated tools from the Paleo, Archaic, and Woodland periods while discovering how Indigenous technologies changed over time.
  2. **A Day in the Life** — Experience everyday life in a Woodland-period village through hands-on exploration of tools, containers, agriculture, and domestic life.
  3. **Storytelling & Craft** — Gather for Indigenous storytelling traditions followed by a themed hands-on craft activity inspired by the stories and cultures explored during the program.

## Colonial History in School Field Trips

---

This interactive colonial experience combines hands-on activities with engaging historical interpretation to help learners connect with life in early New England. This program is easily customizable to any age group.

The program includes three rotating learning stations:

- **Quill & Ink Writing** — Students practice cursive writing using traditional goose quills and ink while learning about colonial communication and historic documents.

## **Package Two: Investigating the Past**

*(Best suited for middle and high school audiences)*

Designed to encourage critical thinking and inquiry-based learning, this 3 station immersive experience explores archaeology, Indigenous technology, and historical investigation.

1. **Stone Tool Evolution** — Examine authentic and replicated tools while exploring how environment and innovation shaped Indigenous life over thousands of years.
2. **Archaeology Research Lab** — Analyze artifacts and evidence to uncover how archaeologists learn about past cultures and lifeways.
3. **A Day in the Life** — Explore Woodland-period village life through hands-on interaction with tools, agriculture, foodways, and domestic practices.

- **Candle Dipping** — Participants experience the everyday chore of candle making and create their own hand-dipped candle using traditional techniques.
- **Colonial America Exploration** — Through artifacts, storytelling, and discussion, students explore daily life, trade, community, and culture in colonial New England.

## **Student Research Labs**

### **From Classroom to Collections**

This customizable program combines in-school instruction with on-site experiences to create an extended inquiry-based learning opportunity. Students engage with artifacts, documents, images, and historical spaces while learning how historians research and interpret the past.

Working alongside our educators, students develop research questions, analyze primary sources, and gather information about historical artifacts. Programs can be tailored to connect with classroom curriculum, local history, colonial Connecticut, Indigenous history, slavery in the North, or other focus areas.

Possible program formats may include in-school or off site field trips, on-site experiences, guided research labs, artifact and primary source analysis workshops, educator-led presentations, collaborative inquiry sessions, and student presentation showcases. Programs can be structured as single-day visits or multi-part partnerships tailored to curriculum goals and grade levels. 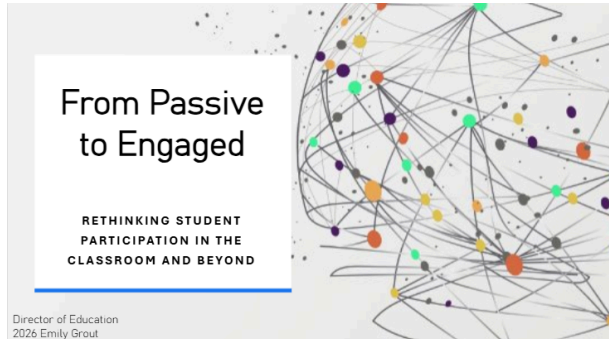

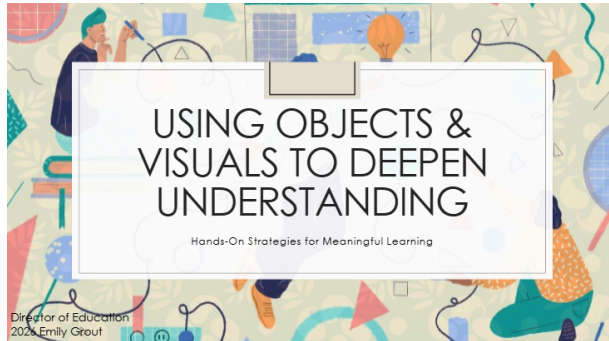
